
'Travellers' sculpture leaves Audubon Park for Jefferson Parish

Four bronze sculptures by New York artist Deborah Masters are being moved from their location in Audubon Park near St. Charles Avenue to West Esplanade Avenue near Power Boulevard in Jefferson Parish, said Michael Manjarris, the man behind the ongoing Sculpture for New Orleans project.

Manjarris co-founded Sculpture for New Orleans in 2006 as an effort to beautify the city in the aftermath of the 2005 Hurricane Katrina and flood. Since then Manjarris, with the help of various artists, institutions and benefactors, has placed scores of sculptures across he city, most conspicuously along Poydras Street.

The Masters sculpture titled "Travelers," seemed particularly appropriate when it was installed in February 2008 since the figures seem to symbolize displacement. The four expressive, larger-than-life bronzes were valued at \$300,000 at the time. The sculptures, on loan from Masters, were a temporary addition to the park, which now has other plans for the site, Manjarris said.

Manjarris said the move was privately funded. Scott Walker, of the Jefferson Parish Department of Streets, said there has thus far been no cost to parish tax payers.

They became the cornerstone of Sculpture for New Orleans, what we represent and what it has become today."
